

British Council East Asia Education Week Event Report

26 – 29 February 2024 Malaysia

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Event Overview

The British Council East Asia Education Week, held from 26-29 February 2024 in Malaysia, marked the conclusion of the British Council's 75th anniversary celebrations in Malaysia and the commencement of its 90th anniversary. This four-day event featured key initiatives aimed at enhancing higher education collaboration and engagement between the UK and East Asia.

Engagement and Collaboration

The event successfully brought together **62 UK universities** and their joint ventures, alongside over **40 universities** from the region, to support the initiatives. Key UK partners such as FCDO, UKVI, DBT, BUILA, UUKI, and QAA participated, along with senior policymakers from 6 East Asian countries and territories, regional partners, influential guest speakers, and media representatives from Malaysia and the UK.

Additional Activities

- A regional education planning meeting was held on 28-29 February 2024 which focused on strengthening evidence and aligning regional and country education narratives with the corporate narrative for 2024/25.
- A study visit by the Government of the Philippines was held on 28 February 2024 to observe the UK's approach to education in Malaysia.

What was achieved

The East Asia Education Week played a pivotal role in delivering outcomes for global programmes related to higher education, fostering sustainable partnerships, and enhancing the quality of international education strategies. Through its diverse and impactful activities, the event set the stage for continued collaboration and excellence in higher education between the UK and East Asia.

About the Forum

ThinkTNE is the British Council East Asia's flagship dialogue series focusing on the quality and excellence in UK transnational education. Initially established in 2018, the Forum serves as a vibrant platform focusing on TNE priorities.

This year's ThinkTNE event followed a series of policy meetings that were held in China, Vietnam, and the UK last year. Under the theme "Progressive Partnerships", this event focuses on collaborative approaches in TNE development, discussing the evolution, challenges, and future directions of TNE, with sessions focusing on quality assurance, student experience, academic and talent development, and employer engagement. The event also marks the launch of a digital publication showcasing insights from the last 25 years of UK-East Asia TNE partnerships. By setting new agendas and ambitions for the British Council's TNE initiatives in East Asia, the forum facilitated dialogue and collaboration among key representatives from both regions. Through keynote speeches, poster showcase, and panel discussions, delegates explored innovative ways to drive partnerships and enhance the quality of transnational education.







UK-Malaysia Higher Education Roundtable

Event details

The UK-Malaysia Higher Education Roundtable and Partnership Showcase 2024 served as a pivotal event in strengthening the educational ties between the UK and Malaysia. With a focus on "Reinvigorating Partnerships, Building Ambition," this gathering aimed to catalyse innovative collaborations beyond traditional educational exchanges.

The event is divided into 2 parts:

Morning: UK-Malaysia HE Roundtable

The roundtable brought together over 100 key stakeholders-including policymakers, university leaders, and education sector representativesto deliberate on strategies to rejuvenate and deepen UK-Malaysia higher education partnerships. Discussions centred on aligning ambitions with regional and global developments, leveraging diverse stakeholder roles, and utilising innovative mechanisms like the UK-Malaysia University Consortium for sustainable collaborations. The event underscored the importance of the UK-Malaysia Memorandum of Understanding in Higher Education as a foundation for future initiatives aimed at advancing the knowledge economy and talent development through innovative partnerships.

Afternoon: UK-Malaysia Partnership Showcase

The Showcase highlighted the accomplishments and challenges of UK-MY educational collaborations in areas such as teaching, learning, mobility, and research excellence. Celebrating the inaugural UK-Malaysia University Consortium, it shared key achievements and outlined plans for the next three years, marking a significant step towards revitalizing and expanding the educational relationship between the UK and Malaysia to meet national, regional, and global priorities.

However, recent years have seen a decline in the number of Malaysian students pursuing UK higher education both overseas in the UK and in-country, and there is currently a sluggish trend in driving new higher education collaborations across TNE, research and mobility between the UK and Malaysia, with a shift in interest and focus on the more rapidly developing markets in the SEA region. This panel will explore the following questions: Why do both UK and Malaysia need to invest in redesigning innovative higher education partnerships to maintain our competitive edge? How can we arrest this complacency and jumpstart innovative collaborations that look beyond merely teaching transactions and recruitment? Where can we find supportive policies, platforms and resources that can drive these ambitions? When does all this need to happen, and what is commitment needed from the various stakeholders in the sector? 
